Bush Doctrine was first formulated by Bush in a speech at West Point in 2002. It has four central tenets:

- 1) Pre-emptive strikes
- 2) Focus on terror networks, not nation-states
- 3) Holding host nations accountable
- 4) Promoting democracy and human rights as a way to fight terror

Criticisms:

There are a variety of criticisms of it, that have been offered on different levels:

- A. Excuse for imperialism (specifically, control over oil)
- B. Provoking more terror in response than it is eliminating
- C. The nations supporting terror have never been democratic and won't become such before many violent years have elapsed
- D. WMDs not found
- E. Unilateralism (instead of by coalition) alienates potential allies in the WOT
- F. The war on terror (Afghanistan as well as Iraq) has already cost us a trillion dollars (not including future interest payments and expenses such as benefits for wounded soldiers)
